Take care and stay safe!

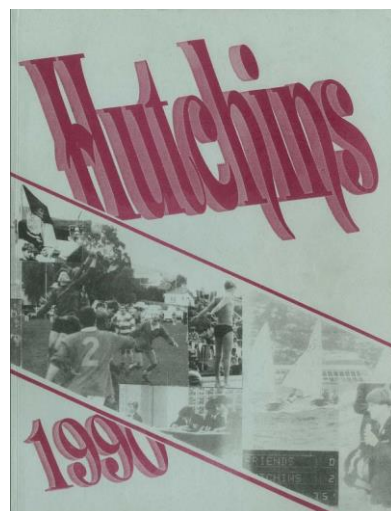

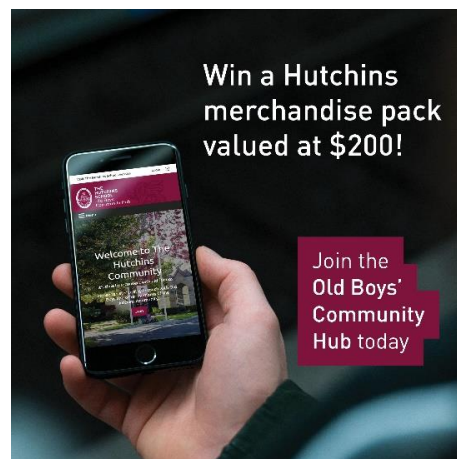


Our Community Hub is LIVE

Miena Village Development

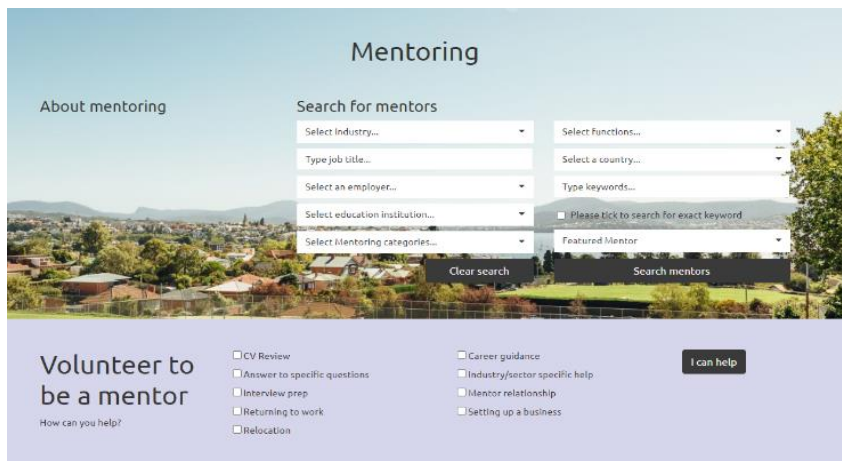
What do you get when you cross a fly-fishing nut with an entrepreneur who has a passion and vision for the high country? The answer is the Miena Village Development.

James Johns ('85) has teamed up with fellow Old Boy and classmate Jason Garrett ('85), to create an incredible vision for the central highlands. Together they have acquired the Great Lake Hotel and have commenced a redevelopment of the site.

The strategy involves constructing a new hotel (to replace the existing Great Lake Hotel) including self-contained accommodation, general store, café and fuel station. The estimated \$20 million investment also includes developing a new 95 km world-class bike trail, known as the Great Lake Trail.

This exciting vision for the township of Miena, perfectly halfway between Hobart and Launceston, is another example of Old Boys collaborating in business.

Spread far and wide

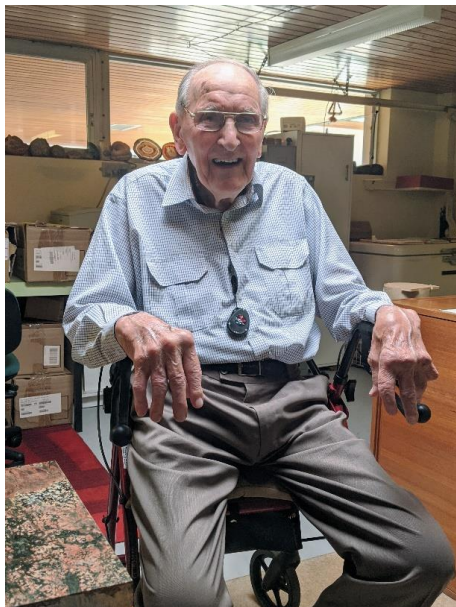
The Hutchins Old Boys' network is unusually dispersed. Many old boys set off to gain experience and travel and many do not ever return which is why we love hearing stories from abroad.

Beyond sustainable Wagyu beef

Tas Ag Co becomes first farm in Tasmania to register soil carbon project eligible through UN Paris Agreement

Tas Ag Co is a Wagyu beef farm just outside of Deloraine, founded by husband and wife team Stephanie and Sam Trethewey ('01).

They produce regeneratively farmed grass-fed Wagyu beef, using a variety of non-conventional management methods. In time, as the business continues to build its soil carbon levels, the

property will be re-tested, with all carbon credits counting towards Australia's global emissions reduction target under the Paris Agreement.

"We're already seeing a steady increase in our productivity as a direct result of our focus on soil carbon. It's exciting because it's not just about improving environmental health. Increasing soil health means we're increasing plant health, which also increases animal health," said Sam Trethewey, Tas Ag Co Managing Director.

The announcement marks a key milestone for the new business as it prepares to launch its product to consumers later this year.
