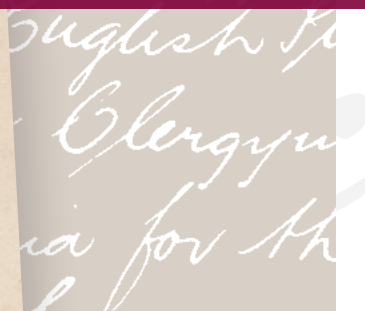

Introducing The 1846 Society

The 1846 Society has been established to acknowledge and honour those who have confirmed their intention to include The Hutchins School in their will. These gifts help shape the School to become a leading educational institution for boys, and encourages further members of the Hutchins family to do the same.

If you have included The Hutchins School in your will, you will be invited to join The 1846 Society, named after the School's year of establishment. Membership is optional.

Members receive an exclusive 1846 Society pin as well as invitations to Hutchins special events, including the annual 1846 Society Lunch. Membership also includes subscriptions to our *Magenta and Black* and *Virtus* magazines.

Letting us know if you have confirmed a gift-in-will is important.

By informing Hutchins of your intention to leave a bequest, we can acknowledge and thank you in your lifetime. It also allows us to ensure that your wishes are carried out.

Leaving a gift-in-will is simple.

You can include a bequest to The Hutchins School when you write your will. Bequests to Hutchins are received as gifts to the Building Fund, specific educational programs, the Endowment Fund or scholarships. Gifts-in-wills play a significant role in the development of the School, and may be a share of an estate, cash, items of personal property or real estate.

Bequests can be 'tied' to benefit a specific program such as an academic discipline, building project or scholarship, or you can allow Hutchins to use bequests 'untied', in areas of greatest need.

SUGGESTED WORDING

Untied bequests

I bequeath The Hutchins School of Sandy Bay, Tasmania, 7005 {(the whole) or (a specific amount or gift) or (a percentage) or (the residue)} of my estate free of all duties to be applied for purposes as its Directors may determine. I direct that the receipt in writing of an authorised officer of The Hutchins School shall be deemed proof of payment.

Tied bequests (purpose specified)

I bequeath The Hutchins School of Sandy Bay, Tasmania, 7005 {(the whole) or (a specific amount or gift) or (a percentage) or (the residue)} of my estate free of all duties to be applied for the purposes of _____ by The Hutchins School in such a manner as its Directors may determine. In the event such a program no longer exists or is no longer in operation I direct that the gift shall be applied in as similar a way as possible to my wish as the Board shall decide at their discretion. I direct that the receipt in writing of an authorised officer of The Hutchins School shall be deemed proof of payment.

Changing my will to include The Hutchins School

If you already have a will, you can add a codicil (a legal provision) to include a bequest. Your legal advisor can add this amendment to your will. This codicil will include the date of the existing will, the date of the amendment and a statement outlining your wishes.

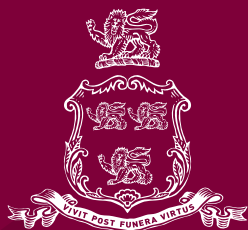
