

It is a blessing to be a part of this wonderful community and a privilege to be directing our Advancement Program. Our mission is to advance and grow a culture of giving and as we undertake this important work, we are constantly striving to build a successful, sustainable and enduring program. Ultimately, we do this work for our students so that they are given the best possible education.

We have had some extraordinary and many wonderful moments in what has been a record-breaking year. While we can be proud of the total dollars raised, the total number of donations is the most important metric. At 1470 donations, this is an indication of our success in building a culture of giving. We are grateful to all our donors regardless of the size of donation.

We are currently in capital campaign mode raising over \$9,071,498 to date (in three and a half years) and as we announced late last year our revised target is \$10M. John Edwards was known to many in our community as a thoroughly decent family man. He was one of those rare individuals who made an extraordinary contribution in so many ways. He enjoyed a successful business career, was a community minded man and a quiet achiever.

He was known privately to assist extended family, colleagues, friends, as well as many causes dear to his heart. While John himself would have been slightly hesitant to be featured in an article such as this, it is for precisely that reason that we must celebrate John's generous contribution.

John attended Hutchins from 1947 to 1959 and was an active and engaged student from the start. He excelled in athletics, winning races and breaking records. In his final year as Captain of Athletics, he was chaired from the field after steering Hutchins to a victory by just one point! He was School Captain and Senior Prefect, Stephens House Captain, Captain of Football and rowed in the First Eight.

John later served with distinction on various committees of the HSOBA, as a member of the Board of Management, Chairman of the Finance Committee and a Director of the Hutchins Foundation. He was a mentor to many and he was inspired to provide life changing opportunities to boys who would otherwise not have the means to attend the School. John sadly passed away in 2021.

The John Edwards Family Scholarship continues and one recipient, 2021 leaver Henry Burnett recently had the opportunity to meet with Mrs Jill Edwards, John's wife, and Mrs Louissa Johnson, his daughter, to say thank you and let them know what it has meant to him to attend Hutchins.

Henry says that receiving a scholarship has pushed him to make the most of his time at Hutchins and he did not want to waste the opportunity that had been afforded to him.

'The effect that giving has on our whole school community cannot be overstated. It is only through the kind-heartedness of donors that people like me are able to experience the best possible education and become part of such an incredible community.'

Billy was awarded the Foundation Community Scholarship to attend Hutchins for Years 11 and 12 and he understood innately the importance of stepping outside of his comfort zone in order to maximise the opportunities presented.

In the space of two years, not only did Billy rise to serve as Prefect and Captain of School House, he was also awarded the prize for Dux! Since leaving school Billy has been incredibly busy with his study at UTAS, setting up and growing his tutoring business, Affordable Tutoring Tasmania and mentoring disadvantaged youth.

His tutoring business started with one student and now has more the 130 students. Some weeks Billy is receiving up to 20 enquiries from prospective students and their parents from around Tasmania and interstate.

He credits his Hutchins journey as his launching pad, although we suspect that Billy would have prospered at any school and we are pleased he chose us! We recently caught up with Billy and he reflected fondly on his Hutchins experience. Whilst it may sound like a cliché, what Hutchins offered me over my short time was truly lifechanging. The opportunities, education, network and confidence the staff, leadership and students provided me is something I will always be incredibly grateful for.'

While Billy threw himself into his academic, sporting and leadership pursuits during his final year, he also somehow found time to complete the tasks required for the 'Gold' Duke of Edinburgh's International Award. This prestigious achievement requires a serious commitment and shows that you have the skills, determination and attitude to really succeed.

An attitude of gratitude

Nicholas Ellsmore ('96) understood the importance of being grateful for his Hutchins experience as a school boy. While he was not able to write to the original donor who funded his scholarship (F R S Dawes), he did go to the trouble of writing to surviving family members.



These days Nick expresses his gratitude by giving back to the School. At a relatively young age he has been successful in business. He was a matching donor for the Giving Day 2019 which raised funds to establish the 1846 Scholarship and more recently, he has become a platinum member of the 175 Club as part of the Make Your Mark campaign. We recently had the opportunity to sit down with Nick.

What age were you when you entered Hutchins?

Year 7, I was 12. I'd just come back to Tasmania after spending five years living in Hong Kong which was an amazing experience.

How did being a scholar impact on your time at Hutchins?

I was going to take every opportunity that was put in front of me and do everything I could to make everyone know that giving me the scholarship was the right decision. I expect it's no coincidence that Year 9 was the first year of the scholarship and I was Dux of Year 9. But the scholarship focused my mind and made sure that I really gave everything that I could.

Tell us a little about your family?

I met my wife, Skye, at University in Sydney where we were both studying the same program (Information Systems & Management). We have two children, Carter (11) and Indigo (6). We regularly visit Tassie, and I'm certainly doing what I can to make sure that Carter and Indi feel as 'Tasmanian' as they can despite having a much more limited connection to the state than I obviously did.

What have been your career highlights so far?

I've had a great career in cyber security and there have been a lot of highlights. I was recognised as the inaugural winner of the Australian Information Security Association 'Information Security Professional of the Year' in 2012. I successfully built and sold two cyber security businesses, the first sold to BAE Systems in 2010 and the second sold to Trustwave in 2018.

What motivates you to give to Hutchins?

I just love Tasmania and I had a truly wonderful school experience at Hutchins. I both feel a debt to the School for what it gave me and I want to do what I can to ensure other boys get as much from it as I did.

I am very conscious that the success I've experienced is in no small part a result of the time and resources that many people (and institutions) have invested in me over a long period of time, really without any expectation of getting anything back. I've had some amazing mentors who have given me great advice, and many of the teachers at Hutchins I include in that. **#** The lives of many students and their families have been directly impacted, thanks to those who have left a legacy gift to The Hutchins School. As you look around the campus you can see the evidence of previous generosity that has helped shape the facilities.

This generosity has also shaped the lives of the boys, whether it be by providing individual support through a scholarship or facilitating and contributing to the many educational opportunities and experiences that a student will receive during his time at the School. Today, those who have confirmed their intention to include Hutchins in their will are invited to joir the 1846 Society.

It has been over 50 years since Simon Bamford ('70) graduated from The Hutchins School, a time he remembers both fondly and vividly. As an 1846 Society member, Hutchins remains a very special place to him. He is grateful because he believes that his time at the School helped influence who he is and how he chooses to lead his life. It was lovely to hear that he considers the friends he made at the School as friends for life and whose company he still enjoys. Simon also made the observation that the School appears to be improving with each generation and is proud that 'so many outstanding graduates continue to make such a valuable contribution to society across all spheres.'

Another member of the 1846 Society is Chris Hood ('95), a third generation Hutchins boy who believes his experience in the School's metal room impacted the direction of his life. When asked about his decision to include Hutchins in his will, he expressed a very clear vision about what he wanted to achieve.

' For me, it is about providing an opportunity to someone who otherwise may not have had the chance.'

Chris still works with metal today and remains grateful for his time at the School. His hope is that through a giftin-will, another young student will also receive the educational experience they need, so they too can 'live their dream'.

The School is so blessed and grateful to have these incredible members of our community who continue to contribute, support, and engage with The Hutchins School and the boys.
