Making a meaningful difference

Dr Sam Johnston ('12), former School Captain, is an alumnus who is applying his medical expertise to make a meaningful difference in the health of vulnerable communities worldwide.

Sam recently graduated from Harvard University with a Master of Public Health in Health Management, receiving the prestigious Gareth M. Green Award for Excellence in Public Health, Harvard's highest student award for public health practice. This recognition stems from Sam's significant contributions to the not-for-profit organisation, Hospitals Beyond Boundaries, where he conducted a comprehensive review on providing impactful and sustainable healthcare in Phenom Penh. Cambodia.

Reflecting on his journey, Sam recalls how the School's dedication to cultivating a culture of service has left an indelible impact on him. Indeed, his early exposure to philanthropy at Hutchins laid the foundation for his commitment to serving others.

'The School encouraged us to actively contribute to our community and to assist those who needed a helping hand. This has had a lasting impact on how I see the world and my role in it.'

Sam also credits the 'incredible teachers and mentors' whose unwavering support influenced his outlook and values during his formative years at Hutchins. These meaningful relationships gave Sam the confidence to explore and develop his passions and interests. 'We had such inspiring teachers, people like Dr Jill Abell and Chris Rae, they always had your back'.

Back in Australia, Sam is currently working as a Critical Care Resident at Austin Health having previously worked at The Royal Melbourne Hospital. As a testament to his achievements, Dr Johnston was honoured as the HSOBA Young Alumni Award winner in 2023.

Celebrating the 1846 Society's commitment to legacy and leadership

We are grateful to the Bequest Working Group (BWG) members for volunteering their time and expertise in supporting the Gifts-in-Wills program at the School.

The BWG provides strategic oversight of the Gifts-in-Wills program and is focussed on growing membership of the 1846 Society and the stewardship of its members. In addition, the BWG monitors and reviews bequests received by the School and reports to the School Board via the Foundation Committee.





Sheng-Yuan Lynch ('23), a 2023 graduate of the School of Performing Arts Music Scholarship, started his piano journey at the tender age of three. His introduction to piano began with learning by ear, revealing an innate passion and strong intuition for music. Subsequently, under the careful guidance of his teacher Shan Deng, he has achieved notable success winning numerous awards and piano competitions, while also obtaining the highest qualification from the National Music Examination Board. the Licentiate in Music. Australia (LMusA) diploma examination on piano with Distinction.

Beyond his personal achievements, Sheng-Yuan's character shines with humility, showcasing his genuine desire to make a positive impact on the world. For him, music is more than a personal gift; it can serve as a powerful tool to bring about change in the lives of others. This philanthropic mindset has motivated Sheng-Yuan to utilise his musical talents to generate support for various charitable causes.

Sheng-Yuan's philanthropic initiatives started at the age of 11 when he held his first charity concert to raise funds for Ronald McDonald House Charities. His commitment to giving back has inspired additional concerts raising funds to support causes such as The Hutchins School Music Faculty, Variety Tasmania and the Red Cross Australia Bushfire Emergency Appeal where he raised a remarkable \$110,000.

In 2019, in an impressive display of dedication, Sheng-Yuan organised a live-streamed, three day piano-a-thon fielding song requests from around the world. This unique initiative not only showcased his musical versatility but also raised funds for Save the Children Australia, further advancing his mission to make a positive impact through music. Sheng-Yuan was honoured with the 2021 Young Citizen of the Year Award at the Australia Day Awards in Hobart in recognition of his philanthropic work.

Looking ahead, Sheng-Yuan will commence a Bachelor of Music at the University of Tasmania, while assisting the School's Music Faculty. His story stands as a testament to his exceptional talent, disciplined practice and unwavering commitment to using his gifts to serve his community.
