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CHAIRMAN of the Board



The 2010 year has been marked by the School's continuing success in the academic, sporting, arts and community spheres and all those who participated and contributed to these successes are to be congratulated.

From the Board's perspective the 2010 year has presented a full agenda. While continuing to monitor the successful implementation of the School's Strategic Plan, the Board participated in a full day's facilitated workshop where the focus was on the future and it considered where the School should adapt to take account of matters such as changing technology, changes in demography, globalisation, economic and future vocational trends, attracting and retaining talent, government relations and the affordability of independent education. The results from this workshop have been distilled and will be used as a basis to modify the School's Strategic Plan to ensure that the curriculum and operations of the School continue to adapt in the face of a changing future.

Around the School the Board has also overseen some significant developments. On 1 November the School officially opened the magnificent new facility, the **HG Baldwin Wing, Library Learning Centre** and **Nettlefold Library**. At that opening I congratulated all those involved in bringing the project from concept to reality, over a very short space of time and against challenging conditions imposed by the Federal Government's Building the Education Revolution funding program. As well as recognising the contribution from the Federal Government I also thanked the many contractors and individuals who worked in close collaboration with the School to ensure the Centre's successful completion and particularly thanked Fairbrother Constructions and their contractors for their high quality and safe work which enabled the project to be completed on time and on budget.

Importantly, The Hutchins Foundation was a significant supporter of the development of the Henry Baldwin Wing. In addition to a direct financial contribution the Foundation Board judged that the Learning Centre met criteria pertaining to a bequest from the late Henry Baldwin and accordingly the Foundation directed funds from that bequest towards the project. The Board is particularly grateful to the late Mr Baldwin and his family for the support provided to the School. As always the support of The Hutchins Foundation in providing ongoing financial assistance which contributes to the continued development of much needed facilities within the School is greatly appreciated and the Board looks forward to continuing its close and fruitful working relationship with the Foundation.

At the same time as the Library Learning Centre was approaching completion the Board was already considering the next significant development for the School. During October the Board approved the \$4.2 million business case to redevelop Burbury House, The Hutchins School boarding facility. For some time the Board has recognised that the boarding house was in need of significant development and after considering several options it was decided that a full refurbishment of the existing Burbury House building represented the most viable alternative. The redevelopment meets the future needs of our boarding community and, while challenging from the financial and logistical perspectives, the Board's view was unanimous that the project should proceed.

The project has already commenced and is targeted for completion during Term 2 2011. While it will result in some disruption to our boarders during this time the Board and School management have been buoyed by the support provided to the project by the boarders' parent community.

At a personal level I feel very humbled to have assumed the Board Chairman's role and I acknowledge the support of my fellow Board members in electing me to the position. In particular I must acknowledge our Immediate Past Chairman, Mr Scott Harvey. With the completion of his tenure as Chairman, Scott announced his resignation from the Board effective 31 December 2010. Scott joined the Board in October 2003 and during his seven years as a Board member he has provided significant insight and leadership into the affairs of the School. Significantly, during his time as Chairman of the Board, he oversaw the development and implementation of the School's Strategic Plan and the Library Learning Centre project. On behalf of The Hutchins School community, I thank Scott for his significant service and contribution and, from a personal perspective, I thank Scott for his support as I have transitioned into the role of Chairman.

During the year the Board welcomed a new member to its ranks. Dr Marcus Haward was appointed as a Visitor's representative on 1 August 2010. Marcus is Associate Professor and Senior Lecturer of Government and Antarctic Climate and Ecosystems at the University of Tasmania. He brings a wealth of experience in education and curriculum development to the Board and we look forward to his contribution during his tenure.

With the resignation of Scott Harvey I am also able to announce that the Hutchins Old Boys' Association nominated Mr Charles Cottier to fill the vacancy created.

I am pleased to announce the Board ratified Charles' appointment effective from 1 January 2011. Charles has a very successful track record as a selfemployed businessman and the Board looks forward to benefiting from his broad experience.



I would also like to acknowledge my other colleagues on the Board, Megan Ayliffe, Charles Brothers, John Groom, Chris Holloway, David Morris and Pam Windsor. They have all made significant contributions which extend well beyond their regular Board roles, providing valuable assistance and advice to the School's management in their respective areas of expertise.

Your Board has always maintained the highest standards of Corporate Governance and reflective of this, at the instigation of the previous Chairman, the Board conducted a governance review to ensure its operations and structure reflected contemporary practice and met the strategic and operational agenda of the School. The result of this review was the refinement of the Board committee structure where the Strategic Planning Committee was disbanded and as such, the future Board agenda will have a greater focus on monitoring and modifying the School's Strategic Plan. The remit of the Finance and Audit Committee has been extended to include oversight of risk management and a new Board committee, the Policy and Planning Committee, has been created with risk management over the School's curriculum, information technology and succession planning for the School's Board and management.

The governance review has also resulted in the Board adopting a new title. To ensure the appropriate distinction between the respective roles of oversight by the Board and management of the School by its staff, the title The Hutchins School Board of Management has been dropped and the Board will be known as the Board of The Hutchins School. It is expected that revised rules reflecting the announced changes will be enacted early in the new year.

The success of the School is reflective of the efforts of all those people directly employed by the School together with a broad band of volunteers. To our staff | extend the thanks of the Board for your continued contribution and guidance provided to the students in 2010, particularly in volunteering your valuable time outside school hours over and above your normal roles. To our Headmaster, Mr Dean, our Deputy Headmaster, Mr Irons and Business Manager, Ms Self, I acknowledge your continued strong and dedicated leadership in attending to the affairs of the School and thank you for the support offered to me as Chairman and the support also provided to the Board in 2010.

Our 164th year has been remarkably busy, productive and successful through all areas of the school. Congratulations to the **Year 12 graduating class 2009** for their achievement of excellent academic results.

The Hutchins School continues a distinguished tradition of strong academic performance

We note with pride that greater than one in three students achieved from a possible 99.95, scores of 90 or better. This is a result any school would covet and in taking this opportunity to congratulate **Matthew Kang** on his achievement as **Dux of State** I wish to note also that the great body of last year's students were represented in first round offers to tertiary institutions of their preferred choice and that our top students were recipients of international, national and state offers and scholarships.

Indeed, The Hutchins School continues a distinguished tradition of strong academic performance and, while we celebrate achievements of outstanding students, it is the continued overall academic strength and consequent access to further studies of the majority of students that is our focus.

The Year 12 graduating class 2010 also achieved a real depth of academic

success as 27% of those presenting for their TCE achieved an ATAR score of 95 or more and 32% achieved a score of 90 or more. Congratulations go to **Tomos Lelong, Christopher Ryba** and **Lachlan Poslek** on their achievement of perfect scores of 99.95. It is a moment of pride in these young men and for Hutchins when the three available top places in the State are awarded to Hutchins students.

Guiding the future of the School is the work of the **Board of The Hutchins School** and again it has been a tireless and most supportive group and I thank them for their support for the work that we do. As this year marks the retirement of **Mr Scott Harvey** from the Board and as Board Chairman, I too thank him for his loyal assistance, energetic support and expert guidance over the past ten years. **Mr Lance Balcombe** has assumed the challenging role of Chairman and I look forward with him to our further successes.

On behalf of the School thank you to the **Parents' Association** for their significant fundraising and contributions to fun events. Please give them your support in 2011.

In 2010 the Commonwealth injected funding into education infrastructure projects and the evidence of our uptake is presented in the **Junior School entrance foyer** and another much needed **classroom** which meets the increasing demands of enrolments in the Junior School this year and beyond.

With the support of the Henry Baldwin bequest and under the same Commonwealth scheme, it is a pleasure to note the building and naming of the **HG** Baldwin Library Learning Centre. The construction of the Hutchins Foundation Archive & Heritage Collection building is another example of the importance of the work of the Hutchins Foundation. A stateof-the-art facility for our Foundation and Old Boys now provides a focus in the School for our alumni.

In 2011 we will be completing an internal rebuild of our boarding facility, **Burbury House**, and I look forward to continuing our enrolment of students from urban and rural Tasmania, the mainland, Western Europe and Asia and the Pacific. Our school culture is undoubtedly enriched by such exchanges and enrolments.

In terms of technological

Thank you too to Deputy Headmaster, Mr Barrie Irons, Head of Senior School, Mr Duncan Warlters, Head of Middle School, Mr Ian McQueen, Head of Junior School and ELC, Mrs Jenny Manthey, Business Manager Ms Jenny Self, and my PA, Mrs Carol Marshall. Thank you to Mr Devine and the Development Office staff for their wonderful support and most professional efforts, especially in the areas so often not noted such as running the business of Hutchins.

In 2010 Hutchins were finalists in First Basketball, Second XI Cricket, First XI Hockey, First XI Soccer and in Water Polo and were Premiers in Athletics, First XVIII and Second XVIII Australian Rules Football, Badminton, First XI Cricket, Junior, Senior and Aggregate Boys' Cross Country, Champions in Years 9, 10 and 11–12 Debating, Second XI Hockey, Under 14 Champions and Under 18, State Premiers in First XV Rugby, State Champions in Sailing (with success for Alec Bailey becoming Yachting Tasmania Sailor of the Year and Third in the world in his class), Second XI Soccer, State Invitational Premiers in Sport Shooting, College Champions and Boys' Aggregate Champions in Swimming and, in Rowing, Hutchins won all but one of the Head of River races and were Australian Champions in Under 19 VIII, Under 19 Coxless IV, Under 17 Single Scull and Under 17 Double and were noted as the most successful school at the National Championships. In any year in any school this is a list of extraordinary achievements. Congratulations and thanks go to all

student participants, to our **Director** of Sport and Co-curricular, Mr Wayne Brown, and all coaches, managers and assistants.

After nearly four decades of committed service to The Hutchins School, its students and community, the distinguished teaching career of Mr Michael Fishburn has drawn to a close.

The impact he has had on the lives and learning of students and staff alike is impossible to calculate, but one thing is certain, his enigmatic presence will not go unmissed.

Mike's tenure at Hutchins as a Science and Mathematics teacher began in 1973, following three years teaching at the Cate School in California, when he was hired by Reverend Dr Dudley Clarke. Thus began 38 years of dedicated teaching at Hutchins during which he has taught Year 8-11 Mathematics, Year 8-10 Science, Year 10 Biology and Biology 3C, as well as teaching Year 11-12 Psychology.

In addition to this core classroom teaching, his commitment and passion for education and enhancing the lives of students has seen him take on many varied roles and responsibilities within the School. He was Thorold Housemaster between 1974 and 1984, Year Head (9-12) from 1976 to 1988 and Academic Co-ordinator for Year 11-12 between 1989 and 2005. He was Acting Head of Buckland in 2004 and appointed Service Co-ordinator by Mr W Toppin in 2006.

His drive to provide students with meaningful opportunities to offer service to others in the community led to him being appointed Director of Community Service Learning by the Headmaster Mr Warwick Dean in 2008 and to the significant contributions made by Hutchins students to the Red Cross Winter Blood Appeal in recent years.

He has also played an important part in the development of Basketball at the School. He was Head of Basketball and Coach of the Firsts team from 1973 to 2005 and has continued to impart his knowledge of and passion for the game as a coach of teams ranging from Year 8 to Year 12 over the course of his tenure.

Mike will be remembered by both students and staff for his passion to share his knowledge and experience, whether that be in the classroom on matters of Biology or on one of his many other passions, such as fly fishing or photography.

And while the halls and staffroom will no longer echo with that familiar Californian greeting, 'howdy', there is no doubt that those who have 'shared a great adventure' with him through his teaching and collegiality will remember the impact he has had on their lives.

Best wishes for the future, Mike, and thank you for all you have contributed to the School and its community. May the trout forever leap at the sound of your wading and your cast be tight looped and always fall straight.

CHAPLAIN

In the Senior School, during Term 2 we had a series in chapel on the different ways of understanding the world that exist in our culture and where they come from. It became clear that the concept of 'worldview' was a new one for many of our students. An introduction to the Naturalism of Dawkins and the Postmodernism of much modern culture proved a controversial one.

Blog

The intention was to start a conversation. And so it did. After a thoughtful message left for me in the question box I suggested that it would be helpful to produce a regular opportunity for students to ask questions and propose their ideas to issues raised in chapel. As a result of this 172 comments have been posted on various issues such as:

Are worldviews like accents? – is there such a thing as a true or right accent?

Are you an Apatheist? ie who cares? (from chapel guest Rev Paul Chew)

Is religion anti-science?

Dr Peter Wilson and Mr Brett Smith from our Science Faculty discussed their view of this relationship as guest bloggers.

We looked at the suggestion by physicist and philosopher, Prof Paul Davies, that faith is involved in all human activity

What is the relationship between ethics and religion? We looked at the recent debate in Sydney over the introduction of ethics as an alternative to the religious education period.

The outcome of this is that beliefs are a part of our conversation at Hutchins. Indeed, my chief comment poster in Year 12 would often write around 2am – after wrestling with his heavy school workload, he would take some time to consider the issues raised by the blog. Although often disagreeing with my views, he made significant efforts to educate himself further on the topic. In turn, he challenged my perceptions and forced me to look at my own assumptions and ask myself 'Why do I believe?' I would love to see our community become articulate about the nature of belief and what our role is in a secular society. We focus on a Christian understanding of that at Hutchins but not exclusively. The importance of understanding (much more significant than 'tolerating') our neighbour must be a basic part of a global-wise education. The blog is one contribution to that discussion that has emerged as a useful tool.

New Chaplain

Rev Mark Holland has made an excellent start at Hutchins as Assistant Chaplain with specific responsibility for the Junior School. He has added a great deal from his youth work background and has run a well-attended JAFFA group (Jesus: A Friend For All) in the Junior School at lunchtime on Wednesdays with assistance from Buckland Chapel Leader Tom Beadle (Year 10). We have both worked in the Middle School with the JAFFA group on Fridays with the assistance of Alexander Elford (Thorold Chapel leader, Year 12). At JAFFA we run a number of fun events while giving students the opportunity to consider their beliefs and discuss Biblical issues. Some of the events include:

- The Annual Lolly Eating competition won by Ayrton Rose (Year 7)
- The JAFFA Cup Cricket (Double Wicket) competition won by a Year 7 combination (Liam Johnston with Patrick Lickiss (and Patrick Ball)).

The Senior School also enjoyed a faithful group of men meeting together, with special events such as the open invitation to watch a debate between well-known antitheist Christopher Hitchens and Christian philosopher, Dr William Lane Craig.

HUTCHINS Foundation

The mission of the Foundation states:

'The Foundation works to ensure the future of Hutchins by supporting the School in an on-going capacity,' while the vision of the Foundation is 'To create a financially secure school where each student is able to develop their personal best.'

This echoes the vision of those who signed the original Memorandum and Articles of Association to set up the Hutchins Foundation in 1977, when it was feared that removal of government funding could jeopardise the future of independent schools. The original aim, then as now, was to create, maintain and grow an Endowment Fund to generate additional income for the School and to support the provision of excellence in educational outcomes.

It is a tribute to the original signatories to the Foundation that the Endowment Fund has grown significantly over the years, while the Foundation has also provided vital support to the School.

These links ... form the backbone of the Foundation and the whole school community

The Annual Appeal continues to be a major fundraiser providing library resources and other specialised equipment, while also providing options for donations to the Scholarship Fund and Building Fund.

Bequests are a key component of the Foundation's financial support base and are being given increased publicity through the *Magenta and Black* magazine and through a new bequest pamphlet designed by Tony Smithies in partnership with the Bequest Committee.

Under the chairmanship of John St Hill the Bequest Committee brings together a group of highly committed supporters of the School. By its very nature their work does not bring immediate dividends, however it is extremely gratifying that Hutchins and the Foundation are now reaping the benefit of the work of this committee, with several significant bequests having been received over the past year.

Old boys Henry Baldwin and Jeffery Boyes were long time supporters of the Foundation and the Bequest Committee, with Jeffery Boyes serving as the first Development Officer for the Foundation in its early years. Their bequests to the School and the Foundation ensure that there is a lasting testimony to their loyal and generous support for the School. *Vivit post funera virtus.*

Following discussions with his family and the executors of his estate, the Foundation agreed to provide \$1,000,000 from the Baldwin bequest towards the construction of the new Library Learning Centre in the magnificent building which now bears his name as the HG Baldwin Wing.

Memorial gifts also continue to be encouraged as a tangible way of assisting the Foundation while also honouring the memory of a loved one.

The Foundation continues to support the employment of the School Archivist and when the plans for the new Library Learning Centre included a major new museum/archives section, the Foundation agreed to provide funding for this area. This is intended to be a valuable community resource and has already become a focal point for old boy gatherings and Foundation activities. An official opening of the Hutchins Foundation Centre is planned for early in 2011.

As in previous years the Foundation co-hosted the Hutchins Staff Dinner, held at the conclusion of the pre-term staff conference week. Held in the former Hutchins building in Macquarie Street, it again provided an excellent opportunity to highlight the history of the School, build a sense of community among the staff and to ensure that all members of staff are aware of the history and functions of the Foundation. The annual New Parents' Dinner was again an enjoyable and worthwhile function, promoting the concept of philanthropy and ensuring that new families to Hutchins understand the vital role of the Foundation.

The Foundation Awards for students known as *Follow your Dreams* attracted over thirty applications. Eight outstanding students were chosen to receive an award of financial assistance to pursue a wide range of interests.

The Hutchins Art Prize Committee, chaired by Peter Forbes-Smith, continued their work with John Ancher, staging the Hutchins Exhibition of Student Art Works which showcased some amazing art works by students of all ages.

Tony Smithies has had another busy year organising Foundation events, Old Boy Reunions, Anniversary events, *Magenta and Black* magazine and assisting the Parents' Association with its activities.

Anniversary Week always showcases the spirit of Hutchins as it brings alive the links between the past and the present. These links also form the backbone of the Foundation and the whole school community. To celebrate these links the Foundation hosted a luncheon during Anniversary Week for past and present Chairs of the Board of Management, the Old Boys' Association, Parents' Association and Foundation Board.

We celebrate the support of parents, old boys, students and staff in maintaining the wonderful traditions of Hutchins. The Foundation depends on the generous financial support of the whole Hutchins community to continue its work into the future.

INTERNATIONAL Relationships

A year of new beginnings, changes and wonderful experiences kept all of us involved with international students and exchanges 'on our toes'.

ommencing early in March Mr Warwick Dean, Headmaster, and selected key staff of Hutchins attended the 2010 Hwa Chong Institute Education Conference in Singapore.

Warwick Dean was especially requested to present a paper at the conference and received much applause and admiration by all as he delivered the paper entitled 'Educating for the Future – A teaching and learning toolkit for the C21st?'

For many years The Hutchins School has enjoyed a very positive and mutually beneficial relationship with Hwa Chong Institute. The two schools participate each year in an exchange program. During the Easter break Hutchins students are offered a teacher-escorted exchange program to travel to Singapore and during November the Hwa Chong students enjoy participating in the life of The Hutchins School.

Being able to be introduced to Asia via the beautiful city of Singapore while in the safe and supervised environment of the outstanding Hwa Chong Institute is a great way for this age group to build their global knowledge and connections. After Singapore Mr Warwick Dean and I continued to Beijing, China on an important mission which resulted in ratifying an MOU with The Second High School Attached to Beijing Normal University to enable a new Chinese Language Immersion Exchange between our two schools. This new exchange aimed to assist Hutchins students learning Chinese to spend one valuable month living the culture of the fascinating country of China. Escorted by Mr Erik Marr, Hutchins teacher of Chinese, the group came back to Australia with great enthusiasm for their studies and a far greater command of their Chinese language skills.

Due to the great success and in readiness for the return exchange by students of Beijing, we welcomed a visit by Deputy Principal – Mr Ruan Guojie, International Director – Mr He Guangzhong and their English teacher Ms Bu (Amy) YuanYuan.

Indian students from The Doon School visited Hutchins on exchange, our French connection continued and, as part of our full-fee paying international program, we welcomed German, Korean, Hong Kong, Singapore, Malaysian and Vietnamese students into the School as boarding students. And this was only the first half of the year! We welcomed our Scottish exchange students and sent our Hutchins student off to Scotland. We continued to welcome groups of visitors to tour Hutchins as well as overseas educators eager to learn about our curriculum.

Our contacts overseas in Europe who refer our wonderful mix of students to our school have envied us as we move into our summer as they brave the winter snow. We live in a fabulous country and a picture-perfect state. Our students are very lucky and I can confidently say having visited schools around the world over the past 11 years that The Hutchins School is one of the finest.

I look forward to assisting The Hutchins School in 2011, maintaining core international relationships with the School's representatives around the globe who refer international students to the School and to explore new opportunities for the School as the economy and strength of countries such as Brazil and Russia drive students to seek quality schooling in Australia.

FROM THE Archives

ith the move to the HG Baldwin Wing completed in September, the new school museum opened for business in the relocated Olga Braham Gallery. While researching and setting up displays is an ongoing process and the preparation of permanent exhibits a thought provoking and time consuming business, the exhibition space is developing in a pleasing manner. One of the most gratifying aspects of the new museum is its central location. Already we have had many students wander in during their recess or lunch breaks. The portable typewriter never fails to interest and amuse - with our 'bookmark-maker,' the old Hutchins Foundation seal stamp, running a close second - proving the popularity of hands-on exhibits. There have also been a number of gatherings of old boys in the museum space, resulting in some very positive comments and several donations to the Hutchins Archives and Heritage Collection. The downstairs archival store is still in a state of somewhat organised chaos from the Big Move, but with the stocking of our new shelving units and compactuses, it should be cajoled into a state of readiness for the start of the 2011 school year.

This year saw the completion of our **Preservation Needs Assessment,** for which we received Federal funding through the Community Heritage Grant scheme administered by the National Library of Australia. Conservator Judith

Andrewartha carried out a thorough and comprehensive survey of items in the collection. She suggested methods of preserving and preventing damage to items in the collection and priorities for their implementation, thus increasing the lifespan of documents, photographs, furniture, artworks and other artefacts. Already we have benefited in numerous ways from the practicality of her advice – perhaps the most obvious being the off-site freezing of the entire textile collection, resulting in pest-free uniforms and other fabric items.

Facing the wrong way and in need of restoration, the flashed glass crest has been singled out in the recent Preservation Needs Assessment for conservation work.

Digitisation of the collection has also progressed far and fast this year, with the allocation of funds making possible the off-site scanning of the entire school magazine collection and the copying to both DVD and hard-drive storage of our film, video and CD collection. The next exciting development – the transfer of data to the School website – is about to get under way. The on-site digitisation of the Hutchins Roll of Scholars is progressing well and will soon provide us with computer access to at least the most basic information concerning each student.

While digitisation of resources and preparation for the move to our new premises – along with the day-to-day tasks of accessioning objects, both new and old, preparing regular articles for Communiqué and Magenta & Black and answering numerous enquiries - took up the bulk of the Archivist's time and energy, space was made during the year for productive engagement with the profession. During the year, I attended a Disaster Workshop organised by the Maritime Museum of Tasmania in conjunction with the Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery which produced valuable information for our own embryonic disaster plan. Meetings of the Australian Society of Archivists included a fascinating series of talks given by past State Archivists and the present incumbent of a redesigned and renamed position at the top level of joint management with the State Library of Tasmania. I also prepared a history walk document for the Year 7 classes on Anniversary Day.

Sadly, our dedicated volunteer, Mr Richard Lord, passed away in November. His assistance will be sorely missed, as will his joy in making himself useful in the field of history and his painstaking efforts to carry out any task allocated to him. Mr David Brammall has been away travelling for much of this year, but we look forward to his return. Now that we have space and dedicated facilities we will be looking to rebuild our team of volunteers in the year ahead. Already we have some keen juniors who have contributed their time during this year, in very difficult circumstances, and we look forward to welcoming them back in 2011.

My sincere thanks to Mrs Anna Kirkland for her cheerful assistance with the digitisation of the Hutchins Roll of Scholars; to the Maintenance, Cleaning and Information Services teams for their invaluable aid with the move and its aftermath; to Dr Jill Abell for her unwavering attention, high expectations and expert guidance through the potential minefields of technology, design and fiscal management; and to the Hutchins Foundation for funding our wonderful new facilities, thus helping to bring to fruition Headmaster Warwick Dean's long-held dream of a proud new museum worthy of displaying the rich and historically significant Hutchins Archives and Heritage Collection.

JOHN BEDNALL Centre for Learning Support

n 2010, the Centre continued to be a busy place providing support and guidance across the School, and continuing to monitor and assess students who come under our care. Students from Years 3 to 6 undertook standardised assessments in Reading, Spelling and Maths.

All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 completed the National Assessment Program in Literacy and Numeracy. Results were available in September. This is another useful tool to assist in identifying students' strengths and weaknesses.

This year the Centre has offered, for those identified students in the ELC and Junior School, an array of gifted programs, ranging from Maths enrichment and problem solving, to research and essay writing skills. The tasks have been set to challenge and motivate the students encouraging them to develop higher order thinking skills that allow them to think creatively and independently. The Junior School students have in particular enjoyed some of the hands-on activities involving the building of structures from paper towers and bridges, to Rube Goldberg machines (overly complex machines designed to do a simple

task involving principles of energy transference and transformation). Much of the work has seen some very creative and intuitive constructions built, with students analysing and evaluating what they have designed.

Students in Years 6, 7 and 8 participated in the Mathematical Challenge for Young Australians. Middle School students were involved in a range of extension projects from publishing a newspaper to preparing a dinner for famous people in the 1640s. The senior students were able to attend a Peter Vardy conference that was titled 'Tomorrow's World' and looked primarily at what is truth in the world and environment around us. The lectures were engaging and thought- provoking, and promoted much discussion. Year 10 Art students were involved in an Artistin-Residence program with local artist, Leigh Steven. It was great that Benjamin Lieutier, a Year 12 student, painted a mural outside the Centre as part of his final Art Production work. It has been a great year with much happening and some inspiring work produced from all students.







The John Bednall Centre for Learning Support in the ELC

We have thoroughly enjoyed working with the ELC boys during 2010. Our program has focused on literacy support, and has included reading, literacy games and writing activities. We used exciting stories to capture the boys' imagination and to develop a love of reading. A favourite story was 'Fish Head Soup,' written by Jill Eggleton. This is a humorous tale about the relationship between Mrs Spatt and her pet spider and the Fish Head Soup that she made. This tale was a great stimulus for the exploration of words. We talked about rhyming words, action words, made-up words and the meaning of words. We also looked at the sounds in words.

ACADEMIC Report

Congratulations to the Year 12 students of 2010 on achieving an outstanding set of results. The Hutchins School is celebrating another excellent year of academic achievement.

B uilding on last year's strong results and Matthew Kang's Dux of State achievement (the fourth time in the past five years a Hutchins student has achieved Dux of State), students in Year 12 obtained an excellent TCE record with perfect scores of 99.95 going to three students: Tomos Lelong, Lachlan Poslek and Christopher Ryba.

This is the fifth time in six years students from Hutchins have topped the State. In addition, a strong 27% of the Year 12s achieved a score of 95 or more and close to one in three students achieved a score of 90 or more.

Indeed, The Hutchins School has again been distinguished by its strong academic performance across the majority of the Year 12 cohort, and I stress that while we celebrate the achievements of outstanding students – and we are very proud of their efforts it is also the continued overall and superior academic strength of the great majority of Year 12 students that is our focus, our strength and our celebration.



DESIGN and Technology

The Faculty of Design and Technology encompasses design and problem solving developments in areas such as Robotics, Design and Technical Graphics, Computer Graphics and Design, Housing and Design and Design and Production with focus areas in metal and wood.

Il students are introduced to the thinking strategies of the design process. These strategies are developed, streamlined and applied to each individual design. Ideas are developed through a process of research and development of concepts that are turned into physical solutions. Understanding the design and physical limits of materials and the realisation that options must be considered are part of the Thinking and Doing process. Skills are developed that assist with the building of self confidence. Along with directional adjustments from teachers, amazing results of self expression and character continue to happen.

ENGLISH as a Second Language

nce again, English as a Second Language classes at Hutchins have been categorised by hard work and steady improvement in the command of a second (or third language). All classes have worked solidly and consistently in class, in preparation for exams and assessment tasks. Forty five students from Hong Kong, Korea, People's Republic of China, Thailand, Vietnam, Germany, Taiwan, Ethiopia and Dubai have studied ESL in Middle School and Senior School at Hutchins this year, with several Junior School students also receiving ESL tuition. As usual, the diverse cultural mix of our classes has led to a rich exchange of perspectives and a strong sense of mutual support and encouragement among the students.

More than ever in the past, I think it is safe to say that international students are participating and excelling in the wide variety of activities and experiences offered at Hutchins. In class, students have written on a range of subjects, in a variety of genres, studied novels, completed research essays and presentations, conducted quizzes and competitions, read many books and stories and completed artwork based on their reading – amongst other activities.

More than ever in the past, I think it is safe to say that international students are participating and excelling in the wide variety of activities and experiences offered

Computer-based learning has been central to work done by all groups. The large combined Years 9 and 10 class, which has had 21 students through the course of the year, did some very interesting work on survival and survivors, the Year 7 and 8s have worked on stories of wild animals, Frankenstein, Sherlock Holmes and Homer's Odyssey. Years 11 and 12 have been challenged to refine their research, presentation and discussion skills around their issues of choice.

We have still found time for fun, with hotly contested challenges in class and trips to the cinema, the Hastings Cave and Pool and the Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery. These challenges were often prepared and run by the students themselves and certainly enjoyed by all.

Throughout the year, great intensive English support has been provided by Mrs Hobeck and Mrs Paddock. Mr Peter Lucas' work with his intensive classes for Middle and Senior School groups has proved to be of excellent benefit in helping students to quickly advance with the language skills which they urgently need to fully enjoy their time at Hutchins.

All in all, it has been an extremely busy and extremely rewarding year in ESL.

FACULTY of Science

his year Hutchins students have produced many excellent experimental research investigations.

Year 10 students Jeremy Yang (The Mpemba effect), Samuel Johnston (Antarctica as a source of water) and Thomas Johnston (Stereo pinhole camera) presented their research investigations at the International Student Science Conference in Taiwan. The week was filled with excursions and lectures to industrial and university facilities on the theme of Green Technologies. Some highlights were the production by the students of hydrogen gas from sewage waste through anaerobic processes; a visit to the Giant bicycle factory and a visit to the education facility at the site of the 1999 earthquake in Taiwan which measured 7.3 on the Richter scale.

Hutchins entered 17 investigations in this year's UTAS Science Investigation Awards. Judges guestioned the students to determine how scientifically they had conducted their experiments and how well they could communicate their procedure and findings. At the presentation ceremony several Hutchins students were successful in winning a number of awards and received cash prizes sponsored by local industries and individuals. Benjamin Armstrong, Samuel Crofts, Michael Manthey and Nicholas McVilly travelled to Sydney to compete in the Junior Youth Physics Tournament. The tournament is run a little like a debate. where teams present a solution to a problem and the other team tries to finds flaws in the solution. Five problems had to be researched which involved many hours of experimental work and research. The students performed creditably amongst teams from Queensland, NSW, New Zealand and Singapore. It was a great experience and gave them a good insight into what it means to pay attention to details and to have evidence for your conclusions.

Andrew Mackay, Jarra Taurian and Jonathon Kearney from the Middle School, along with Mr McCammon, attended the International Kids Teaching Kids Coastal Conference. The boys gave a workshop to nearly 70 young students from many backgrounds. They presented their work on the many ways which humans have devised to protect coastlines from erosion. In addition, they explained some of the other topics which they had covered in class, including climate change and sea level rise. They also described coastal changes which had occurred in Hobart over periods of time, especially at Sandy Bay Beach, and the annual cycle in which sand accumulates in dunes over the summer.

A High Distinction was achieved by Christopher Krushka (Year 10) in the ICAS Science Competition. Sixteen Hutchins students received a plaque for their effort in the National Chemistry Quiz. Plague winners were: Year 11: Charles Haward (equal 1st internationally), Andre Botha, Rory Middleton, Isaac Woo, William Wurf (all equal 2nd in Tasmania), Thomas Dobie, Nanak Narulla, Henry West; Year 12: Lachlan Poslek (1st in Tasmania), Christopher Ryba (2nd in Tasmania), Thomas MacDonald (3rd in Tasmania). The best individual results in the Tasmanian Titration Competition

MARINE School

An often asked question this year has been, "Are you moving the Marine School into the newly acquired and renovated building on the Marieville Esplanade Campus?" This question erroneously implies that the Marine School is separate from The Hutchins School. The Marine School is curriculum devised to provide programs that will educate and interest students in marine activities and the aquatic environment within the existing school curriculum. The focus is on skill acquisition, service and career pathways in marine-related industries. Some elements of programs will indeed utilise our new campus. This has already begun with the use of the gym by rowers and the multi-purpose area by Marine Studies students for snorkelling programs. Currently programs are running for students from Years 5 to 12 in Science, design and boating as well as the established rowing and sailing sports.

Science Extension in Year 8 has focussed on elements of boat design and longshore ecology, linking in with national data collection programs. The Year 9 elective studied coastal ecosystems and water quality. In the Year 10 elective, the students undertook water and boating safety courses so that scientific study could be conducted off the shore in the Derwent Estuary and D'Entrecasteaux Channel.

Students from Years 7 to 12 participated in the Yachting Australia Certificate courses in Competent Crew, Inshore Skipper and Yacht Racing. The service given by Tobias McShane, Timothy Clark and Thomas MacDonald in assisting with Introductory Course candidates or maintenance of the School yacht, *Aurora*, is greatly appreciated. The Maritime Studies class was small this year but of very high quality. Eight students completed all elements of the Coxswain's Certificate, with Fletcher Caldwell and Timothy Clark also completing the Diesel Engineering module.

Working on the Water is a program run by a consortium of private, government and research groups, aimed to expose Year 10 students to the wide range of careers available in marine-related industries. Hutchins students gained 9 of the available 40 places. Over the three days of the program, the students visited oyster and fish farms in the Channel, looked at tourism and fishing, visited the Antarctic Division, Marine Discovery Centre and TAFI, listened to numerous presenters and were given a seafood lunch at Mures.

Our co-operation with the Royal Australian Navy continued this year with members of the Maritime Studies class participating in exercises on board *HMAS Arunta* in Storm Bay. Unfortunately Operation Seagull (skills exercises with the Navy) was cancelled due to cut backs in Defence spending. The *HMAS Tasmania Award* was awarded to Timothy Clark this year as the student who best exemplifies the Navy motto of *Honour, Honesty, Integrity, Courage and Loyalty.*

In memory of the Battle of Trafalgar, to celebrate the contribution of mariners to Tasmania and commemorate those who have died at sea, the Mariners' Service was held on the Sunday after the Battle's 205th anniversary. Michael Titchen carried the Hutchins flag and Roman Marsh and Henry West led the parade of flags around the church.

It has been a while since the opportunity to take students to sea has arisen. In

April, a pilot for the Power of 9 program saw 12 students and 2 staff sail to Port Davey for a week of adventure and service in the World Heritage Area. 12 other students and 2 staff, who had walked in from Recherche Bay, sailed the *Windeward Bound* home. Lyndon Cantwell, Timothy Clark, Gareth Hughes and Sebastian Lopa and two staff joined the *Windeward Bound* for a week sailing along the East Coast. Trips like these build confidence, develop leadership, grow skills and encourage a spirit of discovery in those fortunate enough to participate.

The Marieville Esplanade Campus will serve as a multifunction asset for most programs of the Marine School and Power of 9. It contains a large multi-use room for classes, meetings or functions, a small gymnasium and office and storage facilities. With the rowing shed close by, this will develop into a very useful complex.

THE GRADUATION Statement

The Graduation Statement – developing an intelligent and compassionate community!

In the past, when students completed Year 12 the only document formally provided was a certificate of results issued by the Tasmanian Qualifications Authority (TQA). The Hutchins Graduation Statement was introduced to supplement this, to provide an official and holistic record and testimonial of a student's participation and achievement during his senior years.

It is, in many ways an opportunity to highlight his achievements and maturity achieved throughout his journey. It also continues to complement certificates of a student's participation and achievement in his academic studies issued by the Tasmanian Qualifications Authority.

It includes:

- Academic and Co-curricular Awards during the year, from the Awards Assembly and from Speech Night
- Leadership any leadership positions successfully undertaken
- Service the achievement of the Senior School Service Award and successful completion of the course Community Service Learning
- Further Recognition and Achievement

 any academic, sporting or cultural awards achieved through involvement in the School's program
- Scholarships any scholarships held

 Religion and Philosophy (RAP) – the successful completion of the course Making Moral Decisions.

A student may achieve The Graduation Statement; The Graduation Statement with Distinction; or The Graduation Statement with High Distinction. These three statements are distinguished by the standard of participation and achievement in Community Service Learning and Making Moral Decisions

Our commitment to developing these attributes is real and sustained. For example the Director of Service Learning, Mr Mike Fishburn noted, 'Hutchins is honoured to have participated in the 2010 Tasmanian Winter Blood Challenge and to have topped the event for the fourth year in a row with 106 donations ...'

Over 95 students in Years 10, 11 and 12 enrolled in **Community Service Learning** and enthusiastically involved themselves as volunteer contributors to house, school and community service tasks. Students have been active in blood donation, Cancer Council events, Legacy, Hobart Show, local community groups, services and charities. They have tutored, coached, organised, fundraised, directed and managed events, participated in work groups, and assisted professionals and teachers. Students continue to demonstrate confident involvement, gain accredited recognition, learn of their own capacity to help and provide service and as a result, find their own humanity.

Making Moral Decisions engages students in profound conversations about significant moral and ethical issues. They explore abortion, euthanasia and capital punishment. They attend the Webber Lecture, which this year was entitled 'Integrity – at what price?' The Graduation Statement captures the essence of what it means to be a Year 12 leaver from The Hutchins School. It is awarded to a young man who

- is self-aware and able to recognise and develop his personal strengths and overcome his weaknesses
- does what he can to contribute for the benefit of others in a wide variety of contexts
- reflects deeply on ethical questions, has an awareness of a variety of ethical approaches to moral dilemmas and demonstrates a respect for the diversity of opinions held within the community.

Graduation is, therefore, an important rite of passage and Speech Night is a form of graduation ceremony as it provides, in part, a public occasion to acknowledge and celebrate the achievements of our Year 12s and the expertise and dedication of their teachers.

So what then is its value? It certainly is a testament to a student's commitment to the mission and values of the School. It is also a clear statement by the School of how well we regard him. It is without doubt a significant addition to his resumé.

More importantly it says something to the student about himself, about how he wants to be remembered, about the challenges he accepted, and what he learned. However, Doug Larson, noted that 'The trouble with learning from experience is that you never graduate.' The biggest lesson is that a student's learning is a lifelong journey and that in post-school endeavours he has much to offer his family, his community and, indeed, his school. His Graduation Statement is part of this pathway.

LIBRARIES and Learning

Libraries and Learning Express: All aboard the LLC!

The challenge for the library's express move in September this year into the new Library Learning Centre building was the philosophical, functional and physical merger of the old, the new and ample provisions for flexibility and the future.

School libraries and their learning spaces, like teaching and curriculum **are** undergoing a change of thinking. Some elements of 21st century library design for digital literacy and academic integrity, self-directed learning and independent study draw the familiar library spaces and value of reading for life closer to learning hubs of new technologies with the flexible and always ready to use teaching/classroom sized spaces.

The expansive new facility offers endless opportunities for change and reconfiguration for quiet study areas, spaces for small group work and spaces for reading relaxation. The size of print collections will get slightly smaller as we rely more and more on digital information.

New models of e-commerce for educational publishers, with the rapid growth of e-books, e-texts and audio books catered for by a variety of e-reader 'apps,' and personal devices, mean that the library collection development embraces not only 'bought' materials but licensed materials in a virtual library service. The copyright, digital rights management and licensing issues added layers of complexity for staff and students in the initial and ongoing development of a new e-book service.

The Nettlefold Library went 'RFID' this year, adopting the innovative library borrower and stocktaking technology which uses 'radio frequency identification' tagging. In July, in three weeks, over 35,000 items were tagged and a self-check out terminal was custom designed to enable express checking.

For dedication to the standards of excellence for teacher-librarianship and ICT collaboration, Mrs Kate Reid, Teacher Librarian, was the winner of the Australian School Library Association's Tasmanian Teacher Librarian of the Year 2010 Award.

This year in the Stephens Library, Mrs Kate Reid's focus has been to use technology to promote reading and to emphasise the ethical use of information. In Term 2, Years 2 to 6 concentrated on Digital Citizenship, using resources from the Cyber Smart government website to help students develop a better understanding of how the internet works, the difference between personal and public information, and how to behave responsibly online. Year 6 took this out into the online world by blogging their learning activities on dedicated blogs called Cyberblogs. Year 3 learnt a great deal about the Hutchins intranet, and produced a series of videos to demonstrate their new understandings.

In reading promotion activities over 200 students completed the target of 10 Books in 10 Weeks in the popular Premier's Reading Challenge. For National Simultaneous Storytime in May the ELC enjoyed a reading of the hilarious Bruce Whatley picture book *Little White Dogs Can't Jump.* The next week boys contributed their own innovative strategies to get a reluctant dog into a car! Children's Book Week 2010 theme saw the Library Express continue 'Across the story bridge'.

The ELC and Junior School enjoyed some memorable author visits. The internationally renowned author, Graeme Base, launched his new picture book *The Legend of the Golden Snail*. Year 1 then particularly enjoyed creating their own adventure story picture books.

Years 3 to 6 had the pleasure of hearing Mark Greenwood and Frané Lessac (husband and wife team of author and illustrator) describe how they create their picture books. Years 3 and 4 heard Frané explain how she plans and sketches out illustrations and saw examples of all stages of picture book creation. Years 5 and 6 were enthralled by Mark's presentation of how he researches and writes his Australian historical stories, from *The Legend of Lassiter's Reef* to his new title *Ned Kelly and the Green Sash*.

Middle School students continue to work in the library to gain service hours and their assistance is greatly appreciated.

The Stephens Library now has a blog – nicknamed the SLOG – which is accessed

from the Stephens Library homepage. While this is still in its infancy, there are examples of student work from Years 1 to 5: pictures, written reviews and student-created videos. It is planned to add book reviews, information about library activities and other interesting events.

The *Clickview* server and range of services provides 'video on-demand' to all large screens, desktops, laptops and netbooks in the School. *Clickview* allows the libraries to manage the copyright and serve many types of digital media including audio podcasts and images as well as a vast number of weekly educational programs.

All three libraries – the ELC Library, the Stephens Library and the Nettlefold Library have been able to again acknowledge the invaluable role played by the Hutchins community with the contributions to the annual Library Appeal. In this demanding digital age, it enables the continual acquisition, resource displays and appreciative use of picture books, quality reference works and other print materials beyond the standard textbooks to emphasise both reading for knowledge and *reading for life*.

INFORMATION Technology

he e-learning strategic vision is that The Hutchins School is a 'learning organisation with staff who are ICT competent' and a 'school of the future in using 21st century tools and e-learning strategies to engage and empower all students, staff and its wider community' continues to direct the deployment of IT. Information technology is increasingly available to all teaching spaces to enable students to have a uniform experience regardless of where they are timetabled. The investment in classroom technology infrastructure is targeted at maximising these strategic objectives. An e-learning management team comprising teaching and support staff known for their best practice in ICT and student IT leaders are charged with project initiatives to realise these strategic intentions. Several initiatives have commenced in 2010, including an ICT Audit, launch of an ICT competency framework, a varied program of professional development and a sustained program for safety online.

Led by Co-chairmen, Tomos Lelong and Shervin Aflatooni, the Student IT Leadership team included Christopher Ryba, Matthew Keep, Thomas MacDonald, Joshua Vasicek, Joseph McGrath, Cameron Burnett, Samuel Counsell, George Duckett, Ryan Ward, Andrew Flett, Donald Holloway, Jesse Usoalii, John (Jack) Pereira , Benjamin Robinson, Yashovardhan Makharia, Andreas Souvleris, Harshvardhan Makharia , Alex Hickie, Benjamin Lienert and Thomas Skalicky. Beyond their critical support for every Hutchins function or event requiring sound, video, lighting and communications, and other special public projects ranging from running the sound and lighting for UK visitor, Stephen Heppell's 'Be Very Afraid: Building Connections' seminar to assisting staff with the international

video-conferencing or the GeoDome activities on the annual ICT Expo Night.

Learning resources which had an impact on engaging, stimulating and empowering students to reach the intended learning outcomes have been the netbooks in general classrooms and iPads in assisted learning. Everyday use included standard application software [eq functional literacy and word processing, Science practical work in data logging in spreadsheets, creative image manipulation in design tasks]; internet research, web2.0 and email communication activities; as well as online access to quality digital content in national services and digital videoon-demand with high speed broadband services.





Video-conferencing with high speed, high performance bandwidth to link face-toface with authentic research activities or immersion activities - collaborative experts in cultural and scientific organisations such as Questacon and CSIRO - excited students learning. Classes from Years 4-9 and students in Years 10-12 have enjoyed videoconferencing. Activities ranged from Questacon's Perception and Illusion activity for Mrs Sue Bullen's Year 6 class; Polycom's live cross for Mrs Knight's Year 4 to meet national volunteers who are Extreme Weather Heroes on their Green Corp activities during natural disasters; sessions with expert Professor Graham Durant on the Iceland volcanic eruption or Polar Adventurer and environmental scientist. Tim Jarvis in Antarctica: Year 12 student. Mike Titchen's lead in the student debate on internet censorship in National Science Week hosted by Dr Karl Kruszelnicki ; or Year 11 student, George Duckett's lead in the live link to an international conference in Denver Colorado of teachers to talk about our 'students' digital life.'

Teachers have had regular PD sessions as well as several outstanding tools to quide their professional learning and enable the design of quality instructional programs such as learning to work with their curriculum standards via Electronic Unit Planner [www.eup.com. au]. Benchmarking their ICT skills and competencies with the ICT Audit and a host of online tutorial courseware for just-in-time learning also meant regular professional development sessions to discuss and plan with the intended outcomes of the Federal Government's Digital Education Revolution for the provision of 1:1 computing and deploying of seven powered, secure and mobile trollies of class sets of 28 netbooks to all teaching departments for Years 9 to 12 across the School.

The IT staff team systematically evaluated competitive business enterprise solutions to provide a secure infrastructure and wireless implementation. Risk management, return of investment (ROI) measures and outcomes to deliver safe and effective practices were important considerations. Strategies include RAID, UPS and surge protection on all servers; automated and off-site back up and storage; fast secure wireless installation, virtualisation technology and VMWare; access to high speed broadband bandwidth, cloud storage and AARNET ISP services with a forward implementation of VOIP. A particularly important initiative for 2010 has been the development of the 'apps for the mobile' learning with the introduction of the *Power of 9.*

Our Staying Cyber Smart at Hutchins program comprised the Cybersafety Outreach program with ACMA speaker, Greg Gebhart, independent consultant and ex-Victorian policewoman, Susan MacLean, several evening sessions for parents and a range of sessions for students on managing cyber-bullying and harassment, being 'phone smart', keeping minimal digital footprints, privacy and security with using Facebook or similar social networking sites, a chance to discuss issues such as mobile phone policies or the codes of conduct. In these sustained awareness programs, Dr Jill Abell and Mrs Kate Reid also surveyed students about the way they use technology in Years 5-10 to give accurate data for their design of future cybersafety activities.

High speed broadband, emergent technologies and visualisation tools offered new opportunities for working with new media and visual literacy skills in our 21st century curriculum during 2010. In Term 3, Australia's Academic and Research Network (AARNet) provided The Hutchins School with the opportunity to erect and use the aweinspiring GeoDome. It is an inflatable, immersive 3D theatre wherein the projection design and visualisation can assist students to wonder, imagine and venture to the end of the known universe via NASA's Digital Universe Atlas. The highly interactive visual-spatial experience in the dome allowed learners to interact with the high definition images and video. The fly through tours of the known universe were brought to life by a set of space data and imagery from NASA and images from the global telescope networks, using technologies found in online gaming, such as the hand-held game controller. For Hutchins Junior School students and neighbouring primary student visitors, the afternoon and evening coincided with the vernal equinox. It was also a full moon. For Year 3 studying the day and night sky, a picnic evening was held for families to view the event with the School's telescopes and with members of the Astronomical Society of Tasmania.

OUTDOOR Education

uring the past year students have ventured into the outdoors, sometimes to areas unknown to them and undertaken yet another challenge (or two).

The adventures of 2010 kicked off with two weekends at Southport.

The students and staff from the boarding house got to know each other over two sunny days as they enjoyed swimming, hiking and camping.

Weekend number two saw a group of Middle School mothers visit Southport on a research mission that a number of mums have undertaken over the past few years. This year mums strolled along a rainforest walk, enjoyed some basic kayak instruction and got to know each other over afternoon tea.

The students in Year 7 followed a week later and over the four weeks each class enjoyed the challenges of walking, camping, cooking, kayaking, surfing, navigating, knot tying and team challenges. In the later part of the year they undertook an urban challenge which saw them race around Hobart, between Hutchins and the Domain collecting information from various checkpoints.

In April, some of the Year 6 group experienced a trip to Canberra-Melbourne while some visited Maria Island. The highlights of Canberra included Parliament House and Questacon. As for Maria, the trip highlights included the walk to Bishop and Clerk and then snorkelling and spotting huge crayfish!

Again in August, Year 6 students experienced alpine environments as some undertook camp on the second highest point in Tassie, Ben Lomond, while others flew into Mt Hotham for a week in Victoria's high country. Even in the cold weather, much fun was had and new skills learned.

The first of the Power of 9 Challenges occurred in April. Co-ordinated by Mr Kingston, 23 students departed Hobart aboard the *Windeward Bound*. In the late afternoon of day one, half left the ship at Récherché Bay and began the trek along the South Coast to Port Davey. The sailing group rounded South East Cape and headed to Port Davey to undertake some marine studies before meeting and swapping with the walkers. After sailing, kayaking and some rugged weather, the group arrived home 14 days later. A great experience was reported by all.

Other Year 9 challenges in 2010 included sea kayaking (windy and with side on waves), mountain biking, rock climbing, an urban challenge, surf awareness (including a visit to Shipstern's Bluff), the Overland Track bushwalk (trekking through snow), sliding the slopes of Mt Hotham and the global challenge to Thailand.

The traditional mid-year camp for Year 8s again had groups experience rock climbing, mountain biking and walking during five days on the Freycinet Peninsula. A theme of minimal impact saw many students challenged by the realisation of their own footprint.

In October, a group of senior students undertook a walk to the rugged peak of Frenchman's Cap. Assisted by Mr Duggan and Mr Prior they achieved this threeday walk with some earning a Duke of Edinburgh Award in the process. Well done to Samuel Johnston, Peter Humphrey, Nicholas Rowell and Benjamin Armstrong.

The Year 2 classes ventured to Southport for their big day out orientation in readiness for next year's camp. After stopping at Port Huon we arrived at Southport for a tour, some beach time and a BBQ lunch.

Year 3, 4 and 5 camps occurred in Term 3 and between Southport and Bruny Island JS lads camped, walked, spotted(!), paddled canoes, surfed and played. Some of their own quotes include;

EARLY LEARNING CENTRE and Junior School

Connections

In education there needs to be relevance, authenticity and a sense of belonging and connection. Children journey along four interconnecting pathways – their family, their school, their social and their inner world. The greater the separation of the pathways and the less they are connected, the greater the risk to the child because the opportunity for one pathway to provide strength and direction to another is reduced.

Family Pathway

Family is the first pathway for us all. It is where each child starts to develop a sense of self and connection. It is where they first start their knowledge journey and hopefully it is a world that they always remain connected to.

The Kindergarten boys shared their own 'family stories' in Term 3 giving them all an insight into where they came from and assisting their sense of identity, an outcome which is recognised as vital in the Early Years Framework.

School Pathway

At school the boys are not just learning but making connections. All of our integrated units of work from Kindergarten to Year 6 contain rich concepts of which content is a vehicle to learn about bigger ideas. When boys learn about the exploration of Antarctica in Year 5 – they don't just learn facts about Scott, Amundsen and Shackleton but they explore concepts such as leadership, heroism, bravery, motivation and sacrifice - to make connections with human endeavour on a much broader scale. Costa's '16 Habits of the Mind' also help the boys to make learning connections, to know what to do when they don't know the answer, such as when to persist, when to apply past knowledge and when to create, imagine, innovate and think flexibly.

The family and the school pathways work best when connected and we thank Hutchins parents for the myriad ways that this happens, help in the classroom or sporting arena, the communication between home and school and the time taken by each parent to express the joys as well as the concerns.

EARLY LEARNING CENTRE and Junior School

Good teachers possess a capacity for connectedness. They are able to weave a web of connections among themselves, their subjects and their students so that students have opportunities to reach their potential.

I thank all teachers for their professionalism and their ability not to just teach their subjects but to teach the whole child. I would also like to thank Mrs Lesley Salter who retired at the end of 2010. She has contributed an enormous amount and her compassion and professional integrity will be missed. Mr Eaves left the Junior School last year. However, fortunately his many talents will still be utilised across all of the School in

his new capacity as a Learning Support Teacher in the John Bednall Centre for Learning Support.

Social Pathways

Some of our social connections are changing too. There are new ways of networking using technology and our boys are socialising in whole new ways. However, it is still important for boys to learn how to enrich and nurture these connections. A fundamental part of being a fulfilled human being is the way we connect to ourselves and to others. Learning how to establish, maintain and even restore good relationships underpins everything we do in the ELC and JS. This happens on a daily basis in sport teams, class circle time, prayer time, houses, Junior and Senior School buddies and our restorative justice, behaviour management systems. We are now also a 'Kidsmatter' school and

we look carefully at the importance of social and emotional health and wellbeing. In 2011 we will work with Professor Dr Toni Noble on 'Bounce Back,' an emotional skills program.

Spiritual or Inner Pathway

One of the greatest challenges for young people is to sort out a meaning of life. Boys journey from rules to values; from a world where the school and home sets the parameters, to living in a world where values need to be internalised. Hopefully at school through Chapel, RAVE, class mentoring, and in everything we believe and do at Hutchins, we are providing a solid foundation with strong core values to equip our boys for their lifelong journey.

Songline

Bruce Chatwin wrote in detail about Australian Aboriginal songlines, also known as 'dreaming tracks'. Each totemic ancestor, while travelling through the country, was thought to have scattered a trail of words and musical notes along the line of his footprints and these songlines lay over the land as 'ways' of communication between the most far-flung tribes. A song was both map and direction finder.

These songlines represent the wisdom and knowledge of the ancestors as they made their journeys across the great continent. Aboriginal people believe that each person must go and find the right songline, to connect with their ancestors.

At Hutchins we want each boy to know that his family, school, social and inner or spiritual pathways are all inextricably intertwined and connected to shape his own songline – his personal map and direction finder for life.

Junior School Art

2010 has been a busy and productive year in the Junior School Art room. During Term 2 the students and I set ourselves the challenge to create artworks using recycled materials. These works will hopefully be the start of a collection that adds vibrancy and a young child's perspective to our fantastic permanent catalogue at the School. I am constantly amazed by the creativity, talent and determination of our boys and 2010 has been no exception!



JUNIOR School Music

The Junior School music program continues to flourish with every student from Kindergarten to Year 6 actively involved in music making through a variety of experiences.

Many performance opportunities are created for the students as they become involved in assemblies, Chapel Services, Year 4 Wakakirri, Choir, Year 6 Symphonic Band, Open Day, Anniversary Week, Soirees, the Christmas Nativity Play and Presentation Night.

JUNIOR SCHOOL

String Program

Over 100 students are involved in the String Program. In Year 3 every student is given the chance to play a stringed instrument. An exciting development has been the introduction of the cello, under the direction of Mr Brendan Conroy. The Year 3 students also attended the TSO Children's Education concert featuring the narration and music of *Peter and the Wolf.*



Prep G boys explored lions as par of their work on 'Living Things'. The lion is one of the symbols of The Hutchins School and a lion cub is the symbol for the Early Learning Centre. In keeping with some of the principles of the Reggio Emilia philosophy to Early Childhood Education, the boys expressed their ideas and understandings of lions through 'many languages' – for example painting, drawing, writing, documented conversations and clay work.

One particular lion was regularly talked about by the Prep boys throughout the year. Christian the lion was raised by two men in a house in London and then released back into the wild. The boys were fascinated with the amazing footage they watched on the internet of the adult lion Christian being reunited with his human friends after many years of being part of a pride in Africa.

Mr Gilkes asked the boys some questions about lions:

What do you know about lions?

'The more things change'

A nineteenth century Frenchman, Alphonse Karr once famously said: 'The more things change, the more they are the same.' For our Middle School, 2010 has been a year of many changes and I thought it might be interesting to test Karr's statement through an examination of the results of those changes.

A change in the wider school environment meant the Middle School had access to the wonderful new H G Baldwin Library Learning Centre and our students have gained particular educational benefit already from the displays in the Foundation Heritage Centre and the video-conferencing facilities in the global classroom.

Now, such random assessment of the results of changes in our Middle School for 2010 is most unscientific. His length of service in our Middle School helps Mr Sayers gain third place. Only third, however, because he absented himself throughout the whole of Term I to enjoy the delights of his thoroughly welldeserved long service leave. On his return, it wasn't long before he was contributing just as he always has, teaching diligently and imaginatively, organising the next Red Centre Trip, co-ordinating Basketball. Of course, as is usual for Mr Sayers, he was also ready to 'go the extra mile:' this time it was writing the script of his 2010 Play on Tour on his sick bed.

Of course, Mr Sayers' leave forced us to make a change in that we had to find a replacement for him. Mrs Stoddart filled this gap with wonderful energy but the briefness of her time with the Year 7 team put her fourth on the scale. But, of course the Middle School teaching constants were there in her repertoire: dedication, professionalism and genuine concern for her students. Mrs Stoddart also brought her own individual style to the role, evident in the decoration of her Mentor Room, her interactions with her colleagues and students and the presentation of her lessons. Her daily, cheery 'Moorningggg!' thrown recklessly at all passersby surely reflects her individual style.

In equal fourth place is Mr Geale. He began the year as an agent of change, by joining the Year 7 Pastoral Team after a number of years as a Year 8 Mentor. Soon, he and Mrs Stoddart were in competition as to who would provide the more stimulating and attractive Mentor Room environment. Mr Geale's conscientiousness and genuine caring for the welfare of his students meant that he was an ideal addition to the Year 7 Pastoral. Of course, at the same time, Mr Geale pursued his teaching of Drama, presenting some extremely entertaining plays in the Middle School House Drama Competition and yet another superb Errols evening.

We have all been most impressed by Mr Marr's introduction of Chinese into our school and the number of students electing to study this subject illustrates why we are so impressed. However, staff changes meant we also had to call on him to be a Mentor in Year 7 in the middle of the year. So it's fifth place for him on the Constancy Scale for Year 7. But he certainly deserves to be on the scale because this already very busy young teacher not only agreed to take on the extra duties of being a Mentor but he took them on with determination, and genuine good humour.

In Year 8 Mr Prior and Mr Berndt are both at the top of the scale, because, although they were in fact both new to Year 8 this year, they remained in the Year 8 team all year.

Mr Berndt brought a calming influence to his Mentor Group and combined that with a genuine concern for the welfare of his students. While ensuring that his Design and Technology students were given the maximum opportunities and encouragement to produce top quality work, he also found time to guide a good many Year 8s through the difficult task of completing their Year 8 Projects.

One of Mr Prior's constant tasks must definitely have been changing hats. He had his Head of the Health & Human Movement Faculty hat to wear when organising such things as curriculum, curriculum delivery and staffing. A change of hats meant he became Director of Middle School Sport, co-ordinating all the Cock House activities and ensuring each Middle School student was getting the most out of his sporting opportunities. A quick dash into the nearest phone booth and he would emerge in his Year 8 Mentor hat, ready to guide, to advise and to write reports. And each of these hats seemed to fit perfectly.

After over thirty years of service to our Middle School, Mr McCammon certainly rates highly on our Constancy Scale. Of course, in those circumstances no one could deny him the leave he took throughout Term 2 but it was this leave that dropped him into third place. This was another of our many changes and it must be said that we did miss his calm, caring, consistently pleasant manner and the dedication and innovation he brings to his Science teaching.

Mr Hyland has to share this third position with Mr McCammon and the reasons for this are very similar. Mr Hyland's enthusiastic and selfless service has been a feature of our Middle School for nearly ten years and this year he has continued to take that service to an even higher level through his contribution as Middle School Academic Co-ordinator. This role requires him to oversee and co-ordinate such aspects of school life as reporting, course choices, family-teacher conferences and general curriculum development and delivery matters. So it was another significant change, when he too undertook some very well-earned long service leave throughout Term 3. However, like Mr McCammon, he spent some of that 'leave' in at school, doing reports.

Making a brief appearance on the Year 8 scale was Mrs Ramsey who replaced Mr McCammon in both his teaching and Mentor roles while he was on leave. She brought with her a cheery smile, boundless enthusiasm and a willingness to get involved in everything from the challenges of Year 8 camp to the intricacies of students and their knitting. Also, just as she had done in Term I as a replacement for Mr Sayers, Mrs Stoddart helped out in Term 3 as a replacement for Mr Hyland. So, her completely idiosyncratic, "Moorningggg!" could be heard floating once again through our corridors.

2010 saw a most significant Middle School event in that we changed our Head of Year 8. Because this is such a vital role, any change in the Year Head must have inevitable consequences. I noticed some almost immediately. In what some might see as unseemly haste, Mr Geale had replaced Mr Kingston's wonderful stories









of travel and surfing with some of the funniest jokes of the eighteenth century. Framed posters for The Errols soon graced the walls of the Year Head's office where once diving photos and certificates held pride of place. I'm sure if you asked any of our Year 8s how these men are different as Year Heads, he would reply, 'Well, Mr Kingston is Mr Kingston and Mr Geale is Mr Geale.' And if you asked the same student what these men have in common, his reply would be, 'They're both concerned that we do the right thing; they both really care about us and they're both fun.' It should be noted that in translating these replies from Year 8 Speak I have removed all usage of the word "like" in order to protect the reader's sanity.

A change that was not out of the ordinary this year was our usual welcoming of 100 new students representing half of our overall population, having farewelled 100 Year 8s at the end of last year. This process of changing personnel has two consequences. The first is that we as a staff always feel some regret at parting with students we have come to know and like and have enjoyed working with because of their enthusiasm, their honesty, their sense of fun and their simply being themselves. At the same time though, the second consequence is that we meet 100 new and different selves who always bring with them those same wonderful attributes. So, for the purposes of the scale, I guess you could say these consequences cancel one another out.

Add to the above summaries the constants of the guidance offered our students by our Counsellor, Mr Docking; our Chaplain,



Reverend Matt Grey and his assistant, Rev Mark Holland and the dedicated service they receive from our bus drivers, our Secretary Ms Donna Beadle, our groundsmen and our maintenance staff. Then consider that on any number of occasions when I prowled the Middle School in 2010, I saw our students productively and usually happily engaged in classroom learning activities of all sorts and shapes and sizes and our friend, Alphonse seemed spot on. What a stroke of modest genius my Constancy Scale has proven.

So, the end of another *Virtus* article signifies the end of another year and once again, I have tried a light-hearted way of approaching that summary. But there is no light-hearted way of noting the passing during the year of our Middle School Secretary, Mrs Ros Ranalli. Sadly, we only knew her briefly but what a wonderful privilege knowing her was. Ros' enthusiasm, compassion, sense of family and boundless love of life are treasured memories for us in Middle School. Surely, Ros was the only member of staff who could get away with calling Middle School aged students, "Lovie"!

TIME AND SPACE Program

'Awesome'

That was the response of a Year 7 student to the Year 7 Mother-Son Evening held early in Term I as part of the Middle School's trial of Bill Jennings' 'Time and Space' program.

This program aims to help mothers, fathers and sons better cope with what Bill calls a very significant period of transition. Late last year, the Headmaster, Mr Dean, suggested we in the Middle School investigate the possibility of bringing Bill Jennings' program to the School in 2010. We met with Bill soon after; we really liked the sound of his program and decided to give it a trial.

Essential to Bill's sessions is the idea expressed by people such as Celia Lashlie in her book, *He'll Be OK -Growing Gorgeous Boys into Good Men.* Lashlie writes of the theory that boys are best aided in the transition from young boy to youth in two ways. First, mothers need to understand that often, in order to best help their sons navigate this transition stage in their lives, they need to stand still and let go. However, the second aspect in this process is that they need to feel safe in this 'letting go' through having the certain knowledge that their boy has a good man in his life who then 'steps up' to guide him through this transition period.

Our involvement in this 'Time and Space' program meant that we held two evenings in the first half of Term I. The first was a Father-Son Evening for Year 8s and the second was a Mother-Son Evening for Year 7s.

Both evenings were wonderful examples of the strength of our school community: thirteen staff, two Year 11 students and two parents of boys who had already passed through that particular Year joined between 35 and 45 parent-son couples to participate on each evening.

A briefing dinner for the staff and parents involved on the panel, a panel session, small group discussions, parent-son one to one chats and a very moving culminating ceremony, followed by supper made up the format for both evenings. Each occasion began with animated chatter and ended with parents and sons almost glowing with pride and love. Needless to say that as a school, we were delighted with the results but it is best to finish by returning to the words of those who participated:

A Year 7 boy: I've learnt so much about mum and her views about me and her life.

A Year 8 dad: This was one of the best bonding experiences we have had.

Debating

This year has been very successful for Hutchins debaters and public speakers, from both participation and competitive perspectives. One of our Year 7 teams made it to the semi-finals and all three senior Hutchins debating teams won their section of the Tasmania Debating Union Southern Grand Finals. The Year 9 team: Timothy McQueen, Samuel Smeele, Oliver Johnson, Hugh Johnson, Yashovardhan Makharia, Jun Woo (Brian) Park, Rajat Rao and William Stephenson; Year 10 team: Samuel Johnston, Hudson Jones, Matthew Young, Jonathan Boadle, Nicholas McVilly and George Margvelashvili; and Years 11-12 team: Yuxiang (Allen) Chen, Joska Romero, Nanak Narulla, Matthew Allanby, Frank Burridge, Michael Titchen and Thomas Whiteley deserve our congratulations.

Thomas Whiteley, Frank Burridge and Yuxiang (Allen) Chen successfully argued against a team from Collegiate that sustainability is not only the responsibility of government but is shared by us all during the Tread Lightly Envirofest at the Botanical Gardens. Anniversary Debaters Michael Titchen, Joska Romero and Jordan Graney won back the trophy from old boys Joshua Munnings, Sam Thompson and David Ransley by proving that the roar of the Hutchins Lion is louder than ever. The standard of House Debating was impressive from Years 7 to12. Thorold was successful in the Middle School and School and Stephens were equal first in the Senior School.

Michael Titchen, together with debaters from Collegiate and Fahan, participated in a debate via video-conference as part of the Questnet Conference on the topic: 'That internet censorship is the responsibility of the Australian Government'. The debate, against a Canberra combined schools team, was co-ordinated by AARNet and chaired by Dr Karl Kruszelnicki.

Hutchins was represented by five students at the United Nations Youth Association State Conference. Thomas MacDonald and Nanak Narulla were selected to participate in the UNYA National Youth Conference in Perth involving 100 students from Australia and New Zealand. Thomas represented the Central African Republic and Nanak represented Laos and they debated resolutions, including assistance to Rwandan survivors and environmental refugees. The themes of the conference were 'Advocating for Change' and 'Empowering Minorities'. A major initiative was compiling a YOUth Change document containing messages for change in Australian society sent to the Minister for Education and other politicians.

Captain of Debating, Thomas Whiteley writes:

'Six Hutchins students competed in the Parliamentary Shield debating competition, from which the Tasmanian team is selected for the Australian Schools Debating Championships, which were held in Brisbane during August. I was lucky enough to be selected in this team along with three other Year 12 students from around the state. We competed in debates against every state and territory in Australia over topics ranging from banning the burga, to responses to the rise of China. We were the most successful Tasmanian team in six years and I thoroughly enjoyed the experience.

Another opportunity presented to students at Hutchins is a mock UN Security Council competition called the Ban-Ki Moon Medallion. Each team of two represented a country sitting on the current Security Council and debated a variety of resolutions about current world



issues. Thomas MacDonald and I won the competition and were invited to represent both Hutchins and Tasmania at the National Competition, the Evatt Trophy, held in Canberra in December.'

Speaking

Senior Speech and Performance had a higher profile this year with an evening performance in the Drama Studio adjudicated by old boy, Mr Tim Munro, CEO of the Theatre Royal. Frank Burridge was the overall winner with his entertaining and unexpected answer to the question: 'Has modern communication methods killed the art of conversation?' Govinda Roser-Finch won the Senior Poetry recitation with 'Nightfall in Soweto' and Samuel Johnston won both Intermediate Poetry and Speech Prizes with 'The Road Less Travelled' and 'That our fast-paced society is becoming a problem'.

The performance standard in Middle School Poetry and Prose was exceptional. Year group winners were Thomas Clark-Hansen for 'The Ghoul' and James Burgess for an extract from *The Hobbit*. Max McLaughlin was the overall winner for a lively and entertaining rendition of 'Sister Ginger and the Cannibals'.

Alliance Française prize winners for

2010 were: Samuel Besley (Poetry), Thomas Johnston (Conversation), Matthew Allanby (Conversation), Gautier Pavlovic-Hobba (Conversation, Listening Comprehension), and Charles Haward (Listening Comprehension).

Charles Haward and Matthew Allanby were awarded second and third places respectively in the Concours D'Entecasteaux, open to students from all schools studying pre-tertiary French. After a three hour exam involving aural and written comprehension and story writing, they were shortlisted for the conversation final.

Drama Report

We spend much of our day pretending. Often we are convincing. We pretend we are not sad. We pretend we don't like others. We pretend there's nothing wrong etc. You would think then that it would be easy for Drama students to pretend they are other people! When our students come to their Drama classes we ask them to step into someone else's shoes. This might sound easy on the surface but it's one of the hardest acting skills to achieve. It's all about how you can convince others that the character you are portraying is different from yourself. Have you thought about gestures, voice, movement, emotions and their transitions, their objectives? WOW! This is much more complicated than anyone would ever imagine. Why is it then that when we pretend in daily life this often does not transfer onto the stage? The lights? The audience? Why isn't my performance as good as when I rehearse it or as good as I see it in my head? Quite simply, it's about technique. We can't teach talent but we can teach technique. All our Drama classes are about building a set of techniques and expressive skills. They don't just happen; they are build over a period of time. We see the development of skills culminating in performances and we have been very lucky to produce many and varied shows this year that have showcased where our students are on the technique building ladder. One of the best things about being a Drama teacher is watching our students' dramatic skill develop from Years 7 to 12. That is the true reward.



MUSIC

t Hutchins, so many of our students come through the Dudley Clarke Performing Arts Centre each day. Whether it is for a music class, a rehearsal, a private lesson or even simply to do some practise, you can be assured that there is always music being made. Even when the last students have left the building each afternoon, the music continues throughout the evening and through the weekend.

For many years, Hutchins has supported the musical education of many musicians within the Hobart community. Our facilities are available to many instrumental and choral ensembles. Hutchins has proudly supported such organisations as the Tasmanian Youth Orchestra and the Island Brass Academy along with many community-based choirs. We were happy to support the endeavours of the Tasmanian Music Teachers' Association with their 50th Anniversary Conference in March, along with their Annual Awards competition. Further performances this year included the Huon Valley Mini-Tour, and music in the foyer prior to Speech Night. Close harmony singing requires great skill in listening and intonation, and I commend the students for the amount of enthusiasm and energy they put into their singing.

Late in 2009, five members of the Hutchins Senior Choir were invited to join the TSO Chorus to travel to Adelaide to perform Gustav Mahler's mammoth *Eighth Symphony* at the Adelaide Festival

in March. Isaac Letchford, Thomas MacDonald, Peter Humphrey, Matthew De Hoog and Daniel Westbury began rehearsals with the Chorus in January, and worked with the choir for about three hours per week for two months. We then travelled to Adelaide for a week, with a gruelling schedule of up to six hours rehearsal per day. Fortunately, many of these rehearsals were not required, and so the students were able to spend their free time visiting the Art Gallery, Glenelg Beach and Rundle Mall, or enjoying the facilities at the Blue Galah Youth Hostel in Adelaide. The week culminated in a magnificent performance of the symphony in the Adelaide Entertainment Centre, with a combined choir of about 450, a combined orchestra (TSO and an Adelaide Symphony Orchestra), eight vocal soloists and conductor Arvo Vollmer, before a sold-out audience of over 5000. It was truly the experience of a lifetime, and we are very grateful to the management of the TSO and Chorusmaster, June Tyzack, for this unprecedented opportunity for our students. Since returning, several or our students have again joined the TSO Chorus for performances at the annual Festival of Voices, and a small group has again been invited to tour with the Chorus, this time to Western Australia in August 2011. I look forward to seeing this relationship with Tasmania's iconic orchestra continue to flourish.

The Senior Choir has been extremely busy this year, with performances at the Ensemble Showcase, Fahan Concert, Easter Service, Cathedral Service for the Opening of Parliament, Anzac Day, Service to Commemorate the Malayan Emergency, Anniversary Service, Fahan Winter Concert, and the Spring Concert. The choir will conclude the year with a combined concert with the Tasmanian Youth Choirs, performing Vaughan Williams' *Fantasia on Christmas Carols* on 13 December at St John's New Town.

The highlight of the year was combining with the Collegiate Singers to perform John Rutter's *Requiem* at the Anniversary Concert at St David's Cathedral in August. This required many hours of extra rehearsals over many weeks, and a totally different approach to repertoire, as the work is 40 minutes long. I commend the students for their efforts, in preparation and performance; it was truly an evening to be very proud of. I also want to thank Mrs Anne Morgan, Head of Expressive Arts at Collegiate, for the energy and detail she put into teaching the girls.

The Senior Choir continues to improve, in attitude, attendance, behaviour, technique and tone. It has been good to be able to tackle more challenging repertoire, and I have enjoyed finding more varied performance opportunities for the students. They have already received two invitations to represent Tasmania at interstate festivals in 2011.

Thank you to our accompanist Mr Ben Mackey for his assistance for most of the year.

I would like to thank and congratulate all choristers for their dedicated efforts, and especially Music Captains Macaulay Hagan and Thomas MacDonald for their untiring efforts and striving for excellence.

The performance of the day was run in the U14 age group, with Benjamin Robinson winning the 4km event in a powerful time. Strong runs also came from Gerald Evans (6th) and Jock Mure (7th).

A mammoth Hutchins field contested the Open boys event, looking to take out the College Boys title that had eluded the team for six years. In the last race of the day the Hutchins contingent ran strongly. Charles Haward ran to finish 2nd on the 6km course, with Henry West (5th) coming home with fellow Hutchins competitors James McMahon (6th) and Lawrence (Larry) Owen (7th).

The strong performances from all runners resulted in Hutchins coming away from the event with the College Boys Shield and the Aggregate Boys Shield, narrowly missing out on the Junior Boys Shield.


